We're cited to have names top such as TRD, Toytec Lifts, Bully Dog on board as we launch the new mag. We're also in the process of enabling




Saturday was spent with the Toyota Marketing crew photographing, driving, and critiquing the new 2014 4Runners.

Stay the Trail and Trail Clean Up Day



MORV Explore Update

Between Tacoma Magazine and our trips, we've put over 4,000 miles on the MORV Explore this summer. It has been to Moab twice, Ouray via some amazing trails (see September Tacoma Magazine), Arizona twice, and all over Colorado. Last week I pulled the trailer into the garage for a little autumn cleaning, and to think about what's next for this beauty.



After getting a substantial amount of gear out of the trailer, I noticed a few things:

First, the outside of the trailer looks like it rolled off the showroom floor, except for a little rubbing on the panel facing the tongue. This came from about 2,100 miles of strapping a storage box to the front. The box held fine and served its function, but left a nasty bit of rash on the trailer. A little touch up pain and it'll be just fine. A permanent tongue box will eliminate the need for a strapped down box.



Under the trailer isn't quite as clean (it's hard to get to with the power washer), but it's in great condition. The trailer is stored outside, subjected to the harsh Colorado elements all year when not in use. There are no signs of damage from the trail, the road, or anything. Sometimes a simple design is the best.



In case you didn't read Bob's account of using the trailer enroute to the FJ Summit (Tacoma Magazine, September 2013), he learned the hard way that securing cargo in your trailer is priority no. one. The short story is that Bob didn't get his stove tied down properly, then went over some fun trails on the way to Ouray, destroying the stove in the process. Airing down the tires a bit would've helped some, but failing to secure the stove led to its demise. It also took

its toll on the inside of the trailer so we have a few scratches to touch up inside as well. The MORV includes plenty of internal tie down points, so it's important to use them.

You'll also notice the tailgate is quite scratched up. We've used it extensively as a table, workbench, and field-bar. Sliding heavy items in and out of the trailer is also not great for the finish, requiring a bit more touch up paint. I think some type of cover/protector for the inside of the tailgate is on the list too.




On Our To-do List for 2014:

- Add a permanent tongue box for hardware storage and a battery
- Install a battery with solar hookups in the storage box
- Add a water storage solution
- A new multi-room tent to accommodate our larger family
- Fine-tune our kitchen and camping gear storage

Tooele, UT is home many things, but is perhaps the most famous for Miller Motorsports Park (MMP), and even more notable (among Toyota lovers) for the oneof-a-kind Land Cruiser Heritage Museum. Each year Cruiserheads

section of Land Cruiser history. Well, that's what I thought until I made the trek .25 mile down the road to the LCHM.


Wow doesn't even begin to express the feeling when walking into the otherwise unassuming building. There's no large sign out front saying "here are all the land cruisers," there's just a simple entryway into a good sized building with a few garage doors. Behind those doors though, is truly LC Mecca. The earliest model on the floor is thought to be one of the first 20 series Land Cruisers to enter the US. It's very much 'OEM' and hasn't been restored in any way. From there the museum steps through LC evolution. Several 40 series are restored to impeccable condition, including the newest example, Greg's recently

purchased FJ45L, which is a 4 door 40-series originally produced in Brazil and restored by TLC. The floor does include a 2012 TTSE FJ Cruiser, with factory stickers and shipping material still attached. It's unlikely that FJC has been driven on a public road.

One of the highlights of the event for those interested in Overland Travel was the presentation Greg Miller gave on Expeditions 7 after dinner Friday. He went through several stages of the adventure with highlights of all the team has experienced.








While some people at the event saw this as a "rich guy flaunting his money," I really think the idea behind E7 is what's most important. To paraphrase Greg "My favorite memories have been created in Land Cruisers enjoying activities I love with people I love". 
